Her sense of humor, quick wit and love for life made her a joyful, welcoming presence to her colleagues, her students and their families.

After moving to the provincial center in 2006, Sister Katherine Mary offered herself to help in community wherever she was needed. She assisted in the Facilities Office and offered to drive sisters to appointments or family events. Her outgoing personality and interest in people were gifts she shared as the hospitality coordinator, meeting and greeting visitors, making them feel welcome and at home. During her fifteen years in the Archives, Sister used her artistic and scrapbooking skills to create memorial albums featuring all of the deceased sisters from the Chardon province. These albums were an outstanding contribution, one that will be treasured long into the future. They are currently on display in the heritage area of the provincial center.

Sister's love for Jesus was simple, intimate and powerful. Throughout her life's journey, the joy and love of God shone through her. "Katie" (as she was affectionately known) was blessed with precious, loyal friends and family who recognized that love in her.
